A Message from the Board Chair

Food Brings Hope (FBH) students experienced another successful program during 2011-2012 school year. FBH expanded to eight schools, adding Spruce Creek and Deltona High Schools. We are thankful to Principals Dr. Todd Sparger and Ms. Susan Freeman for offering Food Brings Hope programs to benefit their students. FBH, in collaboration with the United Way's Campaign for Working Families, through the leadership of Ms. Shelia Jackson, started offering the Money Smart Program to each of our schools. Students learned about money management and benefited from other financial information taught. The classes culminated with a celebration where kids received \$50 US Savings Bonds, calculators and piggy banks.

We started the Farshad Babazadeh Honors (FBHonors) pilot program at Westside Elementary. Thirteen of the brightest 4th and 5th grade students were selected to attend a special afterschool program every school-day for 3-hours. These students benefited from extra time with their teacher, Miss Aimee Shank, and extra curricular activities. ERAU's engineering department offered special sessions for the students to learn how to build a rocket as well as learn about other engineering programs! The students toured the campus and spent much time learning about jet engines and simulators. These students finished the year very strong with the majority scoring 4s and 5s on their FCAT tests.



The FBHonors program will be expanded to Campbell Middle School in 2012-2013 to continue offering afterschool programs to these same students who graduated from Westside Elementary, as well as, other sixth graders. The goal of FBHonors program is to offer STEM related activities – mostly math and sciences - to these bright students, follow them through high-school and help them enroll in STEM degree programs in reputable colleges and universities. The United States needs more graduates with STEM degrees and helping our students study and graduate with a STEM degree, in most cases, ensures them a good paying job, thus helping them sustain economic independence and exit a life of poverty.

FBH started working on a business plan for a much needed new initiative this year: The HOPE Project – Helping Others Prosper through Education. In working with more high-school students, we realized Volusia County schools have many homeless teenagers living in our community (76 were counted on March 13, 2012). Through the help of a few community leaders, a new committee was formed to work on this specific issue – to find appropriate shelter for "unaccompanied youth". While tackling this very serious problem, a very generous individual – Mayor Glenn Ritchey, realizing FBH's latest problem at hand, donated a duplex to the organization to benefit these specific students! This was a huge boost to us not only economically but also it served as a reminder of the extensive support we have in our own community. The biggest obstacle homeless teenagers face is the fact that the homeless shelters in our area are only set up for families; so, a single teenager can't apply for residence at a shelter. Therefore, these students are practically left on their own to deal with this very difficult issue. FBH Committee members visited the Bridge House in New Smyrna Beach. Cudas Unhooked committee members, who run The Bridge House, have been very successful in helping many teenagers get off the streets by providing a stable home and the needed support and encouragement to attend school regularly and graduate from high-school. We hope to be able to replicate their business model on the northeast side of the county! Mr. Shawn Lane, one of the founders of Cudas Unhooked, has been very gracious sharing all the information to help FBH start a similar program. We hope we are able to start The HOPE Project during this school year.

Another very exciting partnership FBH formed last year was with Halifax Urban Ministries (HUM). Each year, since the Food Brings Hope program started, the number of homeless students has increased and there are more signs of food insecurity. FBH's goal is to alleviate such fears in our students and to help remedy the problem. Through our partnership with HUM, we were able to start offering weekly food distribution at Westside Elementary for families in dire need of food. Once a week, 50 families were invited to pick up a 40-pound bag of groceries to help feed their families during the weekend. The program was well received and proved very beneficial to our students and their families. FBH was also able to provide food bags and fill pantries in other schools with high level of poverty. We will expand the program to other schools during 2012-2013 school year.

Food Brings Hope was excited to share a Holiday Dinner and the Christmas Show at DSC's News Journal Center with our students. Students were invited by Sodexo for a delicious dinner followed by a Holiday performance by DSC faculty and students. Santa Claus met the FBH students after the performance and treated them to a surprise! Later in the year, FBH students were invited to attend an ERAU Eagles basketball game. The game was preceded by an inspirational talk by Coach Steve Ridder. We are indebted to Coach Ridder as well as Dr. and Mrs. Johnson for always supporting the Food Brings Hope initiative in many different capacities. Another opportunity offered to FBH schools was the exciting field trips to the Halifax Historical Museum where the students learned about the history of the Halifax area. We are thankful to Ms. Fayn LeVeille for providing a memorable learning experience including re-enactors who told the stories of our early pioneers and showed the students artifacts dating back hundreds of years.

FBH's end of the year program was hosted at The Winners Circle of the Speedway. This was a very exciting event for all our students, as well as, the faculty and board members present. Sean Belgrade, VP of Marketing, Daytona International Speedway, gave an inspirational talk to our students. Our students were able to tour the track and afterwards were treated to a delicious dinner, sponsored by Sodexo. Many Food Brings Hope events, throughout the years, have been generously sponsored by Sodexo, under the leadership of Mr. Rodney Cruise. We are indebted to Mr. Cruise and Sodexo and value their partnership in our program. Two students from each school, a girl and a boy, were selected by their schools as the Outstanding Students of the Year and received a gift card as recognition for their hard work and always trying their best! We are thankful to Mr. Mike Mitchener of Sam's Club, one of our HOPE Project committee members, for providing the gift cards. We are also thankful to the generosity of the Speedway Corporation for hosting FBH's End of the Year program as well as the personal involvement of Mr. Dan Houser. We are honored to have some of the most distinguished community members on our board. It is through the selfless giving and leadership of these individuals that FBH has been able to achieve so much in such a short time. We are very grateful to our board members for five years of giving of their time, talent and treasure.

I believe FBH had the best year to date because of the addition of our wonderful Executive Director, Ms. Beth Butera. Beth puts in countless hours to stay connected with each of the schools, providing information, sharing best practices, forming helpful guidelines and acting as a liaison between all the schools, board members, our affiliates and sponsors, and the community at large. I am personally very grateful to Beth for sharing her amazing talents with us. We could have never done so much without Beth's hard work.

We look forward to another exciting year for our returning club members as well as new members and are working hard to ensure FBH students are able to accomplish what is most important to them; including but not limited to enhanced academics, improved behavior, learning of other cultures, visiting colleges and universities, more participation in athletics and sporting events, and also learning to give back to the very community that has worked so hard to further enrich their lives – the lives of our Kids Zone and Teen Zone students.

FBH Board / Who We Are

Who We Are

Food Brings Hope, founded by local businesswoman and visionary Forough B. Hosseini, is dedicated to fulfilling a dream that all school-age children in our community should be free from hunger. Mrs. Hosseini has worked tirelessly the past five years raising money for this initiative and bringing together community leaders in this effort.

Scope of the Problem

Unfortunately, there are hundreds of homeless and hungry children living right here in our own community, most of whom are school aged and sometimes un-reached by the traditional safety nets of our human service agencies. The number of identified homeless children on any given school day last year averaged 2,000 (source: Volusia County School District office of the Homeless Liaison).

Measurable Results

Improved test scores/grades ~ Reduced disciplinary referrals Reduced sickness/absenteeism

Increase in the number of students successfully completing each grade level and working toward high school graduation.

Our Mission

Food Brings Hope achieves collaborative solutions for families with children that experience hunger due to homelessness, poverty, or unfamiliarity with community resources that provide nutritional assistance. We work closely with caring partners in the school district, social service agencies, and other friends who provide us with the benefit of their time and/or contributions.

Food Brings Hope programs are currently operating in Daytona Beach at Campbell Middle, Westside Elementary and Turie T. Small Elementary; in Ormond Beach at Osceola Elementary; in Port Orange at Spruce Creek High; in New Smyrna Beach at NSB Middle and High; and in West Volusia at Deltona High. These are schoolbased programs that provide at-risk students with meals, within the structure of a tutoring atmosphere and activities program.

Key Components of this Program

- Tutoring program
- Transportation from school on Food Brings Hope TeenZone and KidsZone meeting days and to special events and activities
- Nourishing hot meals and snacks
- Fun learning and activities programs
- Student reward system for improvement
- Sponsored cultural events, motivational speakers, sporting events, instruction in managing finances and pursuit of a healthy lifestyle
- Seminars for Junior and Senior High students to learn about options upon high school graduation including college tours, completing post secondary applications, preparing a resume and job interviews.
- Nutritious food to take home over the weekends for the neediest students.

New Programs / Partnerships

"Hands On Banking" Financial Education



Food Brings Hope partnered with United Way's Campaign for Working Families and Wells Fargo Bank to provide a banking program at elementary, middle and high school levels. Wells Fargo Financial experts, using age appropriate materials,

taught *Food Brings Hope* students about individual finances and the banking system. The students were given calculators, piggy banks and were awarded a \$50 US Savings Bond at the conclusion of the six seminars. Shelia D. Jackson, Program Coordinator for Campaign for Working Families at United Way coordinated the program with LaToya Carey of Wells Fargo Bank.

The program offered two formats: one for Elementary students and another for Middle and High School students. The following schools participated in this program: Westside, Osceola and Turie T. Small Elementary; Campbell and New Smyrna Beach Middle; New Smyrna Beach High and Deltona High Schools.

Food Brings Hope believes that equipping young people in their formative years with the basics in financial education will give them the knowledge, skills, and confidence that they will need in managing their money.

"Journey Through Day Town"

In partnership with Halifax Historical Society Museum, a special educational program took children from elementary, middle and high schools on a living history tour of their own community.

The journey, given after school in the Halifax Historical Museum began with a 20 minute movie covering 130,000 years of local history. As the





students toured the museum, reenactors covered the next step of the journey by telling the stories of our early pioneers. Local history gives the students a new sense of identity and a new connection to where they live.

Parade of Homes Charity of Choice



Food Brings Hope was selected by the Volusia Building Industry Association as the 2012 Parade of Homes Charity of Choice. The Association hoped to spread awareness of an issue that has skyrocketed over the past few years in Volusia County - the large increase in the number of homeless students attending our public schools. On any given day, there are approximately 2,000 homeless children enrolled in Volusia County Schools. The VBIA placed a donation jar in each home on the Parade route stressing, "just \$4 feeds a family of four for one weekend".

Halifax Urban Ministries

Food Brings Hope formed a partnership with Halifax Urban Ministries to provide a 40-pound bag of nutritious food (including meat) to 50 needy families at Westside Elementary School for a cost of only \$4 per bag. Receiving nine meals weekly has enabled

many of the families to have the money to pay their rent thus avoiding homelessness!





Unaccompanied Youth

With over 75 homeless high school students in the school district, *Food Brings Hope* has been helping these students on an 'as need' basis. Using the Cudas Unhooked model, *Food Brings Hope* is working on a project to provide housing for these homeless youths on the northeast side of Volusia County so these students can finish high school and either enroll in college or learn a trade. This new initiative, named "The HOPE Project" aims to give these young adults the stability they need to stay in school and receive their high school diplomas.

The acronym HOPE stands for Helping Others Prosper through Education.

Farshad Babazadeh Honors Program





Farshad Babazadeh Honors (FBHonors) Pilot Program for 4th and 5th grade students at Westside Elementary started in January 2012.

Students, from low socioeconomic families, scoring at the top of their class, were invited to sign up for FBHonors. This program provided enrichment activities for the students every weekday from 3-6pm.



Westside Elementary KidsZone

Westside Elementary School's, after school and summer program called, Westside's Night Alive (WNA) has worked with KidZone to provide students with enriching activities in a safe environment. This relationship, through the kindness of Mrs. Forough Hosseini, has provided children with opportunities to experience events they would not ordinarily have had the opportunity to. We are truly grateful for her generosity.

FBHonors

Program was created through the dream of Mrs. Judith Winch to enrich high achieving students. She went to Mrs. Forough B. Hosseini for ideas on how to fund this program. Mrs. Hosseini turned to her family who had suffered the loss of her nephew, Farshad Babazadeh. The generosity of Farshad's parents made the FBHonors program a reality. The thirteen students involved in the program have benefited in many ways including; the science lessons from Ms. Aimee Shank, writing lessons from Mr. Jeremy Phillips, a relationship with Embry Riddle Aeronautical University (ERAU), and an incredible awards ceremony at Plantation Bay Club House.

Banking Program

The banking program provided through Wells Fargo Bank and the United Way, taught the children about finance management. The students received many gifts along the way including calculators, piggy banks, and a \$50.00 savings bond.

Daytona State College Holiday Concert

The December evening bought culture to the lives of many for the first time. Students were able to experience music of a different nature after enjoying a meal provided by Sodexo.

ERAU Basketball and Pizza Night

Students had the time of their lives at the January event! WNA/KidZone students and other KidZone and TeenZone students from the area cheered the Eagles on after enjoying pizza and a presentation from ERAU's coach. The evening ended with a presentation of basketballs to take home and many smiles.

Money was collected by students donating change into classroom containers. Turie T. Small Elementary KidsZone

Turie T. Small Elementary School Kids Zone is a *Food Brings Hope* sponsored program that provides the after school environment for kids in need of special academic and nutritional assistance. One component of this program focuses on providing additional tutoring for students in the 3rd thru 5th grades who need additional support.

KidsZone extended day program had 59 participating each week on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays. Mondays were specifically for 4th grade writing and 5th grade science. While Tuesdays and Thursdays were organized for reading and math assistance for third thru fifth grades. Students were tutored for an hour and a half in the areas of reading, math, science and writing. Additionally 4th and 5th grade students were provided with the opportunity to visit the Museum of Arts and Sciences on Wednesdays for two hour sessions. Activities involved hands-on experiments, building background knowledge through active learning and creative writing techniques.

KidsZone focused on providing comprehensive tutorial opportunities to increase and accelerate the academic achievement of the lowest performing students in the areas of reading, math, writing, and science. In order to provide equity and access for all students who need tutoring, *Food Brings Hope* provided transportation for students who lived two miles or more from school. Snacks were provide for students on Mondays and Tuesdays, with hot meals provided for the kids on Thursdays!

With the help of *Food Brings Hope*, Turie T. Small's fifth grade FCAT Science scores showed the highest learning gains in Volusia County. In the 2010-2011 school year, our FCAT Science scores demonstrated 37% of our fifth grade students proficient in science. On the 2011-2012 FCAT Science, 55% of Turie T. Small's fifth grade students demonstrated proficiency in science! This represented growth of 18 points, the highest learning gains in the district.

Food Brings Hope sponsored several group events throughout the year! Our students attended and the Daytona State College winter musical program at the Daytona News Journal; an Embry-Riddle Basketball game and the end of the year awards banquet at the Speedway. In addition, Food Brings Hope sponsored a special visit to our school. The Iranian American Society presented the Silk Road Dance Company to our first and second graders.



Osceola Elementary KidsZone

KidsZone is a *Food Brings Hope* sponsored program at Osceola Elementary School. KidsZone offers academic tutoring in reading, writing, and mathematics to students in third through fifth grade.

KidsZone students met on Tuesdays and Thursdays throughout the 2011-2012 school year. In order to accommodate the academic needs of all students, the program was divided into three sessions. The three sessions were offered to third, fourth, and fifth graders to help them prepare for the FCAT. *Food Brings Hope* provided the 100 KidsZone students with nutritious snacks during their tutoring sessions. Each Thursday the students enjoyed a hot meal before they went home. To help make KidsZone accessible to all students, *Food Brings Hope* provided transportation home for the students who did not live within walking distance of the school.

Students who attended the second round of KidsZone participated in a "Hands on Banking Program". Students applied math skills to real life situations and learned important financial skills such as budgeting, distinguishing between needs and wants, and how to balance a checking account. Upon graduating from the program, students received a savings bond.

Students proudly wore their KidsZone t-shirts and sweatshirts on field trips to a holiday concert and the end of the year awards ceremony at Daytona USA.



Campbell Middle TeenZone



TeenZone met every other early-release Wednesday afternoon from 2:45 to 5:00pm. Upon reporting to TeenZone, students were treated to a light nutritional snack and then focused on their homework assignments, preparing for exams, reading for the principals' 20 book challenge, etc. Sponsors assisted students in all subject areas. The homework sessions were followed by 10 - 15 minutes of exercise, then 35 minutes of direct instruction in math, reading and language arts. Students were also given an opportunity to work on the computer to receive additional assistance by logging on FCAT Explorer, as well as Math Counts.

Hot meals were then served to the students. Students assisted by setting the table and passing out condiments to their fellow students. The students enjoyed fare such as tacos, Sheppard's Pie (both were made with ground turkey) and chicken Alfredo. Each meal was served with either a vegetable or salad. The drinks were water, crystal light or sugar free kool-aid. Meal times were always a hit with the students.

Several first year TZ members requested to remain in TeenZone. What a compliment! We offered empty spaces not filled by our freshman to returning sophomores. These sophomores were returning with the understanding they would be the role models and peer tutors for our freshman. The sophomores were wonderful at welcoming and helping our newest TeenZone members. Each week we had 15 to 20 attend our Wednesday meetings. The time was dedicated to academic support by means of tutoring or the ability to go to other teacher classrooms to retake tests, make up work, or receive tutoring from the core teacher. This was very important because most of these students do not have transportation home after school hours and this academic support time was imperative to our students' success. The teacher contact time evens up the playing field for students without transportation after school, which was a huge benefit from this wonderful program.

TeenZone meetings began every Wednesday at 1:45pm with an hour of academic homework/tutoring time. Students that needed to work with a teacher would check in and report to the appropriate classroom. At 2:45pm all members were back together for our weekly activity which would run between 45-60 minutes depending on our meal. The students really enjoyed the last 20-30 minutes having dinner together. This gave us time to listen to the students and hear about them in a casual atmosphere. We met the bus around 4:00 and students were on their way home with their homework completed and stomachs full. There were never any leftovers. Students would ask to take food home to a younger sibling or for their supper later that night. The meal, the academic support, and transportation home made a huge difference in the day for these high school students.

We were fortunate to have participated in many events offered by *Food Brings Hope*. A very meaningful program was the eight week Personal Finance Program where our Teen Zone students spent one hour weekly learning about saving, investing, and spending money. Upon completion each student received a certificate of completion and a savings bond. Other events we participated in was the Maz Jobrani Comedy Show, DSC Christmas Concert, Embry Riddle Basketball game, and Daytona Speedway Year End Awards Banquet. Each event had a special meaning and offered TZ students an inspirational message and opportunity to learn from experiences these high school students would not otherwise attend.

Our time together this second year of TeenZone was a huge success. *Food Brings Hope* offers the support that could not be afforded by our school. Students need this partnership to be successful not only as a student but a productive member of our school.

Our students not only received academic support, community activities, and nutritional meals on Wednesdays but they were afforded the opportunity to join clubs that would never have been attended due to transportation issues. Students with good grades were able to attend clubs that met on Wednesdays during the month. What happened next was unexpected? We watched some of our TeenZone members run and win officer positions for next year's clubs. What an experience to watch these freshman grow, learn, and celebrate the successes. Then, to see them take on leadership roles in community clubs was exciting. These students are very appreciative and wanting to continue next school year. Food Brings Hope did exactly that ... it gave students a successful start to high school as well as helped returning students who needed a place to get support to succeed!
