Young Athletes show off skills

EDGEWATER - Young athletes put on an exhibition of their skills May 10 at Edgewater Public School. This was the third year for this Special Olympics event that featured more than 60 students in a wide variety of events that showed off the progress of what they've learned.

"The Young Athletes program is an innovative sports play program for children ages 2-7 with intellectual disabilities and developmental disabilities and their peers, designed to introduce them into the world of sports," said Denise Breneman of Special Olympics Florida - Volusia County. "First and foremost, these activities will help the children improve physically, cognitively and socially. This program also raises awareness of the Special Olympics program and serves as an introduction to the resources and support available within Special Olympics Florida to families, agencies and schools."

She explained that the program is designed to address two specific levels of play. Level 1 includes physical activities focused on developing fundamental motor tracking and eye-hand coordination. Level 2 concentrates on the application of these physical activities through a sports

throwing, striking and kicking.

"We have 10 elementary schools in Volusia County who participate in the Special Olympics Young Athletes program, over 500 Young Athletes. Edgewater Public was the first school to start this program in Volusia County. We want to encourage parents to continue to involve their children in our local program," Breneman said.

"We have 12-15 volunteers here helping today," added Carol Casey, a teacher at the school. "These students
